RSL Australia Calls For More Veteran Support in Next Week's Federal Budget

The Returned & Services League of Australia (RSLA) says next week's Federal Budget must include initiatives that improve the lives of the nation's veterans and their families, and funding to address inequities and barriers that continue to be experienced by the veteran community.

National President Greg Melick says the RSL is looking forward to a May 9 Budget that confirms Australia's commitment to support veterans and their families, and importantly provides the funding to fully implement the recommendations of the current Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide.

"We are anticipating a Budget that honours our veterans' service and sacrifice, and one that rightly recognises the strength of their continued contribution to our communities and our country," Greg Melick said.

Greg Melick says the Budget needs to focus on people, both serving Defence personnel in view of the recently released Defence Strategic Review, as well as veterans and their families.

"Particularly, we are looking for a commitment to demand-driven funding to support veterans' welfare, rather than having to fight for funding each budget year," he said.

"No previous Government has agreed to this imperative and the RSL believes it is essential that this is addressed.

"According to the 2021 Census, one in 20 Australian households include at least one person who has served or is currently serving in the Australian Defence Force. These service people make a significant and unique contribution to our nation both during and after their service."

RSL Australia made an extensive pre-Budget submission to Treasury calling on the Government to make budgetary provisions to remove some of the inequities and barriers that veterans and their families continue to experience. This includes budgetary provisions to:

- Establish an independent body led by a National Commissioner for Defence and Veteran Wellbeing to guide prompt implementation of the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide
- Extend non-liability healthcare for mental health treatment to ADF reservists on completion of the enlistment process
- Strengthen the advocacy system and enhance the Advocacy Training and Development Program to better support veterans to navigate the DVA claims process
- Review and uplift DVA remuneration for healthcare providers to better enable veterans to access timely and appropriate healthcare
- Achieve a tangible reduction in the administrative burden placed on healthcare providers in accessing DVA remuneration.

Greg Melick said it was encouraging that the current Government had already acted to implement some improvements, including to simplify and reform veterans' entitlement legislation. This is welcomed and the RSL and the veteran community are now looking for that momentum to be accelerated in next week's Budget.

"This Budget provides the opportunity for the Government to comprehensively change the way in which Australia treats its veterans.

"The social and economic contribution made by our veterans and their families post-service is incredibly valuable to our nation. Funding action to help maximise their skills and capabilities represents a sound investment for us all," Greg Melick said.

FEDERAL COURT OF AUSTRALIA

Clinton Earl McKenzie v Commonwealth Superannuation Corporation

[2023] FCA 396

SUMMARY

In accordance with the practice of the Federal Court in some cases of public interest, the following summary has been prepared to accompany the orders made today. This summary is intended to assist in understanding the outcome of this proceeding and is not a complete statement of the conclusions reached by the Court. The only authoritative statement of the Court's reasons is that contained in the published reasons for judgment which will be available on the internet at the Court's website together with this summary.

- 1 The applicant, Clinton Earl McKenzie, served with the Australian Defence Force (ADF) for over 20 years. During his time in service, Mr McKenzie was a member of, and made contributions to, the retirement benefits scheme established by the *Defence Force Retirement and Death Benefits Act 1973* (Cth) (the **DFR Act**). The DFR Act relevantly provides for the provision of retirement pay to members of the ADF (the **DFR scheme**). That scheme is administered by the respondent, the Commonwealth Superannuation Corporation.
- 2 Upon retiring from the ADF in January 1996, Mr McKenzie became entitled to retirement pay under the DFR scheme pursuant to s 23 of the DFR Act. On 6 December 1995 and within the three month period before retirement permitted by s 24(1AA) of the DFR Act, Mr McKenzie elected in writing “*to commute a portion of his or her retirement pay in accordance with*” s 24 of the DFR Act (the **election**).
- 3 The sole question for determination in the proceeding was whether, on a proper construction of ss 23 and 24 of the DFR Act, Mr McKenzie’s election permanently reduced the annual amount of retirement pay to which he was entitled (as the respondent contended), or whether his retirement pay was reduced only until he reached the age on which his expectation of life factor in sch 3 of the DFR Act was based (as Mr McKenzie submitted).
- 4 This question turned upon the proper construction of s 24(3)(b) of the DFR Act which, when Mr McKenzie retired, provided that, following a commutation election, a recipient member’s annual retirement pay was reduced “*on and after the day on which the election takes effect*”.
- 5 Mr McKenzie, who appeared without legal representation, made helpful, clear, and well-prepared submissions. In essence, Mr McKenzie submitted that the words “*on and after*” in

s 24 of the DFR Act should be construed as having an implied temporal constraint, so as to not apply once a member has lived beyond the applicable expectation of life factor in sch 3 of the DFR Act.

- 6 However, the Court rejected Mr McKenzie's construction of the DFR Act, finding that it would involve reading words of temporal limitation into s 24 which Parliament had not seen fit to enact. The Court held that, contrary to Mr McKenzie's submission, Parliament's intention that a member's annual retirement pay be permanently reduced following commutation is plain from the unqualified text of s 24(3)(b). The remedy for any unfairness in the scheme of the kind identified by Mr McKenzie lies in the hands of the Parliament. The originating application filed on 12 July 2021 was therefore dismissed with the parties afforded the opportunity to make submissions on the issue of costs.

A COUNTRY TOWN REMEMBERS

At 0428 hrs the dawn Service in Emerald central west Queensland commenced. Prior to that I watched the people arrive to join in the service. Families with children and rugs spread themselves around the town cenotaph, people talking quietly to each other.

A young man arrived on his Harley Davidson Fat Boy motor bike dressed in the familiar uniform of a motor bike rider. He seemed to be alone. I approached him and introduced myself and we started to talk.

He was there to honour his Grandad a Trooper in the Light Horse, it was the first time he had been to anything like an Anzac service.

The captains of the colleges addressed the assembled crowd (now numbering about 300) about their thoughts on what Anzac meant to the youth of Emerald.

And two high school girls sang, unaccompanied, the National Anthems of Australia and New Zealand.

At 1000 hrs the marshalling area for the main march was alive with most of the population of Emerald!

The St. Patricks College brass band was in attendance.

The standard of the playing was, in my opinion, world class.

1030 hrs the march commenced to the Cenotaph.

The band lead followed by about 120 ex-service members including one civilian marching in honour of his great uncles who served in Bomber Command.

The police, ambulance, SES and other service organisations followed.

But what was most remarkable was the hundreds of school children accompanied by teachers and parents clutching their wreaths to be laid at the cenotaph.

These were not normal wreaths usually prepared by florists, these were ones prepared and made by the children from paper, cardboard, paper and illustrated in texta pens, crayon and coloured pencils.

During the service these were reverently laid without much prompting from the “grown ups”.

The crowd estimated to be about 3000 applauded each and every group that marched past them.

Unfortunately, the RAAF was not able to provide a catafalque party this year so four young SES cadets volunteered for this traditional task.

Lunch at the Bowling Club was the traditional roast meat and three baked vegetables followed by a trifle complete with both green and red jelly, cake with raspberry jam and the richest custard I have tasted in a long time.

As we have noted that some of our members are using the Grapevine email address, please find below the article from The Canberra Times about the expected closure of the Grapevine address from May 31, 2023 .

Grapevine email addresses to be closed as system is no longer supported

Email addresses linked to the early days of the digital revolution in Canberra are set to be cancelled, in a move that could affect up to 13,000 inboxes.

Grapevine, a joint venture between ActewAGL and TransACT, was established in 2005 and was the first service many Canberra customers used to access the internet.

The internet service provider was taken over by TransACT, which was then [sold to iiNet in 2011 for \\$60 million](#).

Now iiNet has told customers who still hold email accounts on old Grapevine domain names their inboxes would be closed from May 31.

"Once closed, you will no longer be able to send or receive emails using your mailbox, email forwarding to or from another email address will stop, you won't be able to access any existing emails stored on the mail server and any messages sent to your email will bounce back to the sender as undeliverable," customers were told.

Users with [@grapevine.com.au](#), [@grapevine.net.au](#) and [@homemail.com.au](#) email addresses are understood to be affected.

The company said the decision was not related to the cost of maintaining the email addresses, but said the platform was no longer supported.

Richard Webb said he had used a Grapevine-linked email address for more than 18 years.

"It is literally impossible to identify before the end of May the many hundreds of places that I have used my email address, and to change my account details. In many cases I will be unable to change an email address on an account after the end of May because the system concerned will seek confirmation of the attempted change from my old email address," Mr Webb wrote to iiNet customer support.

"This massive disruption to my life will also be writ large across thousands of other people in Canberra."

There were 23,000 active Grapevine email accounts a decade ago, when a fault meant thousands of customers were unable to access their inboxes. iiNet believes 13,000 accounts could be affected by the closure but was unable to confirm whether all those were currently active.

iiNet has recommended affected customers migrate their email addresses to a web-based service, like Google-operated Gmail.

The company has also promised no contract break fees or modem payout fees would apply to customers who choose to cancel their iiNet broadband service as a result of the decision to cancel Grapevine email accounts.

A spokesman for TPG Telecom, which owns iiNet, said the Grapevine email system had reached the end of its life and the company began notifying customers this week to give them time to migrate to other services.

"We appreciate the closure of this legacy email system may be disappointing for some customers and have provided detailed information on our iiNet website to assist with the closure process," the spokesman said.

GRAPEVINE EMAIL ACCOUNTS

Having read of the closure of Grapevine email accounts on 31 May 2023, I sought advice on what we might be able to do to help members deal with the situation.

Having checked several sources, I offer the following link as an option for members to seek assistance. Should anyone wish to do so, please complete the survey on the link.

A highly recommended IT Consultant, John Welsby, will then offer his assistance to close Grapevine accounts and open new ones with reputable service providers. The Sub-Branch will offer the resources available in our training room to facilitate this process. John will also answer any related questions members might ask.

- * It has no monetary value, but at the same time it is a priceless gift.

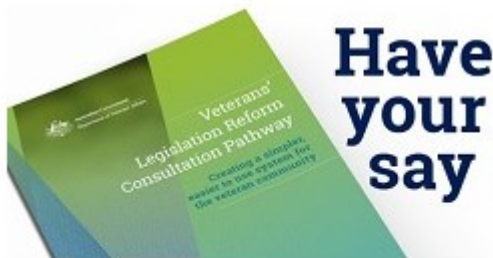
